Gramática - Possessive Adjectives

In English we use “my, your, his, her, our, their” when we want to talk about to whom things belong.

In Spanish, there are two words meaning “my”: “**mi**” and “**mis**”.

Look at these examples.

Eg. Voy de compras con **mi** madre.
*I go shopping with **my** mother.*

Eg. Voy al cine con **mis** amigos.
*I go shopping with **my** friends.*

Can you tell when we use each one?

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my	mi / mis	our	nuestro / nuestros (m) nuestra / nuestras (f)
your	tu / tus	your	vuestro / vuestros (m) vuestra / vuestras (f)
his / her / its	su / sus	their	su / sus

Notice that there are 4 words in Spanish for “our” and “your”: masculine singular and plural, and feminine singular and plural.

(una) familia = (a) family

(un) gato = (a) cat

padres = parents

(un) hermano = (a) brother

(una) hermana = (a) sister

(un / una) amigo/a = (a) friend (un amigo = a male friend / una amiga = a female friend)

un coche = (a) car

(una) madre = (a) mother

(una) casa = (a) house
